Waltzing Matilda was written by Banjo Paterson in 1895 at Dagworth Station, near Winton in Central Queensland and first published as sheet music in 1903.

The song (originally very Scottish/Irish in flavour, as above) was later put to a military marching beat and tune to assist in recruiting young Australians to fight in the 1st World War. It is that later military version which has become popularly known around the world.
